STATE FINANCES.

Notwithstanding the perpetual clamor of our Copperhead cotemporaries about Black Republican extravagance, dishonesty, &c., says the Harrisburg Telegraph, it must be evident to all that the finances and credit of the State were never in better condition than they are now.

Moreover, under Democratic administrations of former years, from 1841 to 1860, large amounts of the debts of the Commonwealth had been falling due from time to time, and no provision made for its renewal, much less for its payment.

Such is our financial record as a State for the last six years. She has paid an extra war expenditure of five millions—she has paid over five millions more on the debt bequeathed to her by former Democratic Administrations.

After the House had ordered the impeachment testimony to be submitted, and before the arrival of the time for adjournment had prevented the execution of the order, several facts concerning the evidence leaked out in the conversation of certain members of the Committee, who considered the order as equivalent to a removal of secrecy.

JUDGE SHARWOOD AND THE NATIONAL CURRENCY.

By his famous dissenting opinion in the case of Borie vs. Trott, on the point of the constitutionality of the money which paid for the war, Judge Sharwood says: "I am of the opinion that the provisions of the act of Congress of February 25, 1862, declaring the notes issued in pursuance of that act to be lawful money and a legal tender, is unconstitutional."

are in a state of chronic trouble because we claim and the popular voice gives us the title of the Union party. The explanation is simple and historical. We have defended the Union against Jefferson Davis, Jeremiah S. Black, Andrew Johnson, Henry Stanbery, and the nullification judiciary of half a dozen States which sought to strangle the nation by opposing the draft and discrediting the currency under the specious charge that they were unconstitutional measures.

Hon. Alexander Henry and Hon. N. B. Browne, of Philadelphia; Hon. Wm. H. Armstrong, of Williamsport, and T. H. Nevin, Esq., of Allegheny, have been appointed by Governor Geary, a commission under the provisions of the joint resolution of the last Legislature, approved April 17, 1867, which authorized the appointment of a commission to inquire into the various systems of prison discipline of other States and countries as compared with that of Pennsylvania, and also to report plans and estimates for a central penitentiary, if they believe such an institution desirable or necessary.

Congress, by refusing to take mileage for this session, proves that its coming together in this crisis was purely a matter of patriotism. The Union representatives to-day are impelled purely by love of country and pity of the South.
