STATE FINANCES.

Notwithstanding the perpetual clamor of our Copperhead cotemporaries about Black Republican extravagance, dishonesty, &c., says the Harrisburg Telegraph, it must be evident to all that the finances and credit of the State were never in better condition than they are now. During the recent war over five millions of dollars were expended by the State in extraordinary purposes connected with the contest, and yet the old Keystone, under Re publican rule, emerges from the struggle, not only with her credit unimpaired, but with her public debt actually diminished over five millions of dollars since 1861; and this, too, after having repealed all laws taxing real estate for State purposes

Mereover, under Democratic administrations of former years, from 1841 to 1860, large amounts of the debts of the Commonwealth had been falling due from time to time, and no provision made for its renewal, much less for its payment .-In 1866 the aggregate of these overdue loans of the State was some twenty-three millions of dollars. The present Administration promptly determined that this reproach should be taken away, and in January last advertised for the redemption of all these overdue obligations, and succeeded in effecting an exchange of new securities for the whole, at par. JUDGE SHARSWOOD AND THE NA-TIONAL CURRENCY.

By his famous dissenting opinion in the case of Borie vs. Trett, on the point of the constitutionality of the money which paid for the war, Judge Sharswood says:

"I am of the opinion that the provisions of the act of Congress of February 25, 1862, declaring the notes issued in oursnance of that act to be lawful money and a legal tender, is unconstitutional.'

This Note is a Legal Tender for all debts, public or private, except duties on imports and interest on the public debt, and is receivable on all loans made to the

United States. In 1862 all the bonds of the United States were gold-bearing; hence the restriction in the endorsement, which is, however, in favor and to the benefit of creditors of the Government-the men who had lent it money to carry on the war and pay the soldiers.
