IMPORTANT NOTICE.—At a meeting of the School Directors of the borough of Mifflintown, held on Friday evening last, the following resolution was unanimously adopted. The citizens of Fernmanagh township living adjacent to our borough have now an opportunity of sending their children to school more convenient to their homes, and at what it costs to school a pupil in our own borough.

Resolved, That, in order to harmonize the feeling that has existed for a number of years between the School Directors of the borough of Mifflintown and the citizens of Fernmanagh township living in the vicinity of the said borough, we propose to them that if they pay the School Directors of said borough the sum of \$4.00 for each scholar they will be admitted into our schools. One-half of the amount to be paid at the commencement of the scholar going to school, and the remaining half to be paid when the term of school is half expired. The agreement to be made by the Secretary of the School Board of said borough previous to the scholar being admitted to our schools.
