THE REPUBLICAN POLICY.

The platform so ingeniously erected for a Republican Congress by President Johnson and his advisers is already demolished.

1. The reconstruction question will not be reopened. The legislation already enacted on this subject will be adhered to and carried into effect.

This is the labor undertaken by Congress, and it will occupy all the time and attention of the Republican members to get through with it.

To retrace our steps, after having gone so far in adjusting the southern troubles, would be ruinous. The determined adherence of the rebels to all their old errors was exhibited so plainly when they were entrusted with the civil government of the conquered States, as to leave no room for doubt that a countervailing element must be found, and it has now been provided in the organization of the Republican party there.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—A conference of soldiers and sailors representing various States of the Union, was held at Washington city, on Monday, the 16th inst., to take into consideration the propriety of calling a National Convention for the purpose of nominating candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

General Brisba has written a letter to the President of the National Soldiers' and Sailors' Union, urging the holding of a National Soldiers' and Sailors' Convention to meet some time previous to the assembling of the National Republican Convention at Chicago.

Admiral Porter has written a letter about St. Thomas, of which the following is an extract: "St. Thomas is a small Gibraltar of itself, and could only be attacked by a naval force. There would be no possibility of landing troops there, as the island is surrounded by reefs and breakers, and every point near which a vessel or boat could approach is a natural fortification, and only requires guns with a little labor expended on the fortified works."

Chicago, Dec. 13.—A special dispatch from Omaha, dated the 12th inst., says that a correspondent at Fort Laramie, writing on the 8th, says that a party of Sioux came in the day before and desired to make peace.

Hon. George Sharswood took his seat as a Judge of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, on the 24 inst.

OUR REPRESENTATIVE IN CONGRESS.

In the House of Representatives Hon. Geo. F. Miller, last week, introduced a joint resolution to prevent any further contraction of the currency; which was read a first and second time, and referred to the Committee of Ways and Means.

Mr. Miller also introduced a joint resolution for the purchase and annexation to the United States of America, of British Columbia, including Vancouver's island, provided the same can be accomplished upon such fair and honorable terms as may be satisfactory to both nations; which was read a first and second time and referred to the Committee on Foreign Affairs and ordered to be printed.

On Wednesday, a bill to repeal the cotton tax passed by a large vote. In the debate, Mr. Miller urged that cotton was as justly liable to taxation as any other product, and feared that this might be an entering wedge for taking off the duty on liquor, tobacco, etc.

THE SENATE yesterday received from the Committee on Territories the bill to prohibit polygamy in Utah. It is very clear and sharp, and will, if adopted, make an extraordinary sensation in the Mormon Kingdom.
