PHILADELPHIA MARKETS. PHILADELPHIA, September 22, 1898. FLOUR.—In the Flour market there is more activity, but at a decline of fully 25c per bushel. About 1000 bbls. changed hands, chiefly new wheat Northwest extra family, at \$9.50 to \$10.00, including some old do. at \$9.75 to \$10.50, Pennsylvania and Ohio at \$10.12; fancy lots at \$12.00 to \$14.00, and extras at \$8.25 to \$8.50. Rye Flour is steady, with sales of 100 bbls. at \$8.50 to \$9.50.

GRAIN.—There is a fair demand for prime wheat, but other descriptions are neglected, sales of 5000 to 6000 bush. good and prime red at \$2.20 to \$2.25, and 1000 bush. amber at \$2.30 to \$2.35, white ranges from \$2.40 to \$2.60. Rye is steady at \$1.55 to \$1.60 for Pennsylvania and \$1.35 to \$1.40 for Southern. Corn is dull and 10c lower, sales of 1500 bush, yellow at \$1.27. Oats are held firmly. We quote Pennsylvania at 75c to 77c, as in quality.

GENERAL ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS in and by an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled, "An Act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth," passed the 23 day of July, A. D. 1896, it is made, the duty of the Sheriff of every county within the Commonwealth to give public notice of the General Election, and in such notices to enumerate: 1. The Officers to be elected. 2. Designate the place at which the election is to be held. 3. JOHN DIETRICK, High Sheriff of the county of Juniata, that on the SECOND TUESDAY OF OCTOBER next, (being the 13th day of the month,) a General Election will be held at the several election districts established by law in said county, at which time they will vote by ballot for the several officers hereinafter mentioned, viz: "The persons to fill the office of Auditor General of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania."

One person to fill the office of Surveyor General of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. One person, in connection with the counties of Dauphin, Northumberland, Union, and Snyder, to represent this District in Congress. Two persons to represent the counties of Juniata, Millin and Huntingdon, in the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. One person to fill the office of County Commissioner of Juniata county. One person to fill the office of County Auditor of Juniata county.

I ALSO HEREBY MAKE KNOWN and give notice, that the places of holding the several General Election in the several districts and townships in the county Juniata are as follows, to wit: At the Court House in the borough of Millintown for the borough of Millintown. At the Court House in the borough of Millintown, for Fernanagh township. At the School House in Mexico, for Walker township. At St. Ann's School House, for Delaware township. At the School House in Thompsonport, for the borough of Thompsonport. At the Public House of Thomas Cox, for Greenwood township. At the School House in Richfield, for Monticello township. At St. Ann's School House, for Susquehanna township. At the School House in McAlisterville, for Fayette township. At the School House in Patterson, for the borough of Patterson. At the School House in Perryville, for the borough of Perryville. At the Locust Grove School House, near the residence of John Martin, for Millford tp. At the Spruce Hill School House, for Spruce Hill township. At the School House at Academic, for Beale township. At the School House near McCulloch's Mills, for Tuscarora township, except that portion of it lying north-westward of the summit of the Shale Mountain. At the Lock School House near the residence of Benjamin Walls, de'd., for Lack township, except that portion of it lying north-westward of the summit of the Shale Mountain. At the Centre School House, for so much of the townships of Lack and Tuscarora as the north-westwardly of the Summit of the Shale Mountain. At the Church Hill School House in Turbett township.

I also make known and give notice that an Act of Assembly, approved March 30th, 1896, provides as follows: SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the qualified voters of the several counties of this Commonwealth, at all general, township, borough and special elections, are hereby, hereafter, authorized and required to vote, by tickets, printed or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges of courts voted for, and to be labeled, outside, "Judiciary;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all State officers voted for, and to be labeled "State;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for, including office of Senators, members of Assembly, if voted for, and members of Congress, if voted for, and to be labeled "County;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all township officers voted for, and to be labeled "Township;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers voted for, and to be labeled, "Borough;" and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot boxes.

I also make known and give notice that at the time and place a vote is cast at the district election of the county will vote for or against the removal of the County Seat from Millintown to Perryville, in the following manner: to wit: All in favor of removal shall vote by ballot on a written or printed ticket labelled "For Removal," and those opposed to removal shall vote by ballot a similar label on the outside of the County Seat and on the inside of the County Seat. The "For Removal," and the tickets thus polled shall be placed in a separate box, to be counted out and the number of votes, for and against, returned in like manner by the Return Judges as those for county officers.

I also make known and give notice, as in and by the 4th section of the aforesaid act, I am directed, that every person accepting office in the county will have no part in the removal of the County Seat from Millintown to Perryville, in the following manner: to wit: All in favor of removal shall vote by ballot on a written or printed ticket labelled "For Removal," and those opposed to removal shall vote by ballot a similar label on the outside of the County Seat and on the inside of the County Seat. The "For Removal," and the tickets thus polled shall be placed in a separate box, to be counted out and the number of votes, for and against, returned in like manner by the Return Judges as those for county officers.

I also make known and give notice, as in and by the 4th section of the Act of Assembly, entitled, "An Act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth," approved April 18th, 1896, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section "shall not be construed so as to prevent any military officer or borough officer from serving as judge, inspector or clerk of any general or special election of this Commonwealth."

AND WHEREAS, By the Act of Congress of the United States, entitled, "An act to amend the several acts heretofore passed to provide for the supplying and calling out of the national forces and for other purposes," and approved March 3d, A. D. 1895, all persons who have deserted the military or naval service of the United States, and who have not been discharged, or relieved from the penalty, or disability thereon provided, are deemed, and taken, to have voluntarily relinquished and forfeited their rights of citizenship, and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens thereof.

AND WHEREAS, Persons, not citizens of the United States, are not, under the Constitution and laws of Pennsylvania, qualified electors of this Commonwealth; SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That in all elections hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, it shall be unlawful for the judge or inspectors of any such elections to receive ballot, or ballots, from any person or persons embraced in the provisions, and subject to the disability, imposed by said act of Congress approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote any ballot or ballots, or any such election to receive ballot, or ballots, from any person or persons embraced in the provisions, and subject to the disability, imposed by said act of Congress approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote any ballot or ballots, or any such election to receive ballot, or ballots, from any person or 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
