NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the Coroner, Justices of the Peace and Constables of the county of Juniata, that they be then and there in their proper persons, at I o'clock in the afterneon of said day, with records, inquisitions, examinations and other remem-brances, to do those things that to their offices respectively appertain, and those that are bound by recognizance to prosecute against the prisoners that are or then may be in the the prisoners that are or then may be in the Jail of said county of Juniata, be then and there to prosecute against them as shall be then and this city. All Furs Warranted, No misrepresentation to effect sales.

By an Act of Assembly, passed the 8th day of May, A. D. 1854, it is made the duty of the Justices of the Peace of the several counties of this Commonwealth to return to the Clerk of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace, of the respective counties, all the reecgnizances entered into before them by any person or persons charged with the commis-sion of any crime, except such cases as may be ended before a Justice of the Peace, under the existing laws, at least ten days before the commencement of the session of the Court to which they are made returnable respectively, and in all cases where any recognizances are entered into less than ten days before the commencement of the session to which they are made returnable, the said Justices are required to return the same in the same manner as if said act had not been passed.
