PROCLAMATION.—WHEREAS the Hon. JAMES H. GRAYMAN, President Judge of the County of Juniata, of the 9th Judicial District, composed of the counties of Juniata, Perry and Cumberland, and the Hon. THOMAS L. MILLIKEN and SAMUEL WATTS, Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of Juniata county, have issued their precept to me directed, bearing date the 9th day of Sept., 1870, for holding a Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Jail Delivery, and General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, at Millintown, on the first Monday of December, 1870, being the 5th day of the month:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the Corner, Justices of the Peace and Constables of the county of Juniata, that they be then and there in their proper persons, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, with records, inquiries, examinations and other remembrances, to do those things that to their offices respectively appertain, and those that are bound by recognizance to prosecute against the prisoners that are or then may be in the Jail of said county of Juniata, be then and there to prosecute against them as shall be just.

By an Act of Assembly, passed the 8th day of May, D. 1854, it was the duty of the Justices of the Peace of the several counties of this Commonwealth to return to the Clerk of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace, of the respective counties, all the recognizances entered into before them by any person or persons charged with the commission of any crime, except such cases as may be ended before a Justice of the Peace, under the existing laws, at least ten days before the commencement of the session of the Court to which they are returned, and in all cases where any recognizances are entered into less than ten days before the commencement of the session to which they are made returnable, the said Justices are required to return the same in the same manner as if said act had not been passed. Dated at Millintown, the 2nd day of Nov., in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy.
