No Liquor on Election Days.

The following bill having passed both Houses and received the Governor's approval, has become a law: SEC. 1. Be it enacted &c., That from and after the passage of this act it shall not be lawful for any person in this Commonwealth, whether licensed or not, to sell liquors, to sell or give away to be used as a drink any spirituous or malt liquors, wine or cider, or any other substance containing alcohol or any part of any day set apart or to be set apart for any general or special election by the citizens in or within any of the precincts, wards, townships, counties, or any other election divisions or districts in the Commonwealth.

Brick Pomeroy's Domestic Affairs.

In a dispatch that was dated at Washington, May the 2nd, the following is said of Brick Pomeroy's domestic affairs: Some time ago Mrs. Pomeroy, wife of the somewhat notorious "Brick" Pomeroy, engaged the services of Gen. Butler as counsel for the purpose of procuring a divorce from her husband.

A Whole Town Burned.

PITTSBURG, May 8.—About 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, fire was discovered in a house in the upper end of the town of Fagudas, in the oil regions, and in less than two hours the town was in ashes.

Kuklux Stult at Work.

TALLAHASSEE, May 4.—Two members of the Florida Legislature were assassinated on the night of the 3d inst. Three members of the Kuklux arrived in Tallahassee to assassinate Governor Reed.
