The Coal Troubles.

On Tuesday of last week a riot between a number of miners and laborers of the Scranton region took place at Scranton.

About a hundred laborers had met back of Hyde Park to discuss the question of resumption independently of the miners.

Another despatch to the same paper, but a day later, says: The bodies of three murdered laborers were found this morning in a swamp near Briggs' shaft.

The End of the Coal Strike in the Pottsville Region.

The following articles of agreement were entered into between the Anthracite Board of Trade and the Miners' and Laborers' Benevolent Association.

First. The operators' proposition as made in Philadelphia, namely: Basis to be \$2.50 at Port Carbon, with outside wages at \$9 per week, inside wages at \$10 per week.

Second. The M. and L. Benevolent Association's proposition of \$3 at Port Carbon as a minimum, with wages as last year at that rate.

Third. Prices shall be obtained from a list of all operators shipping over 20,000 tons in 1870.

laborers, to be treated in the same manner as other articles of necessity. As an alternative proposition, if the men prefer, we will make an advance of five cents per ton and a proportionate advance per car over the price offered on the first of December.

The foregoing propositions are made with the assent of, and are concurred in, by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company.

The propositions were rejected on the part of the miners and laborers by the following resolutions or articles: PROVIDENCE, May 13, 1871.

1. All questions of disagreement in any district, excepting wages, which cannot be settled by the parties directly interested shall be referred to a district board of arbitration.

2. If any question arises involving the whole county, a board of arbitration shall be chosen, consisting of five members on each side, with the same rights and duties as for district boards.

The 'Taxpayers' Convention of South Carolina.' That was in session during last week, adjourned sine die on the 12th inst.

Second. That the State and county offices, both elective and appointed, have been unnecessarily multiplied, and should be reduced in number.

Fourth. That he is in favor of the cumulative system of voting and minority representation, and would be glad to see it made a part of the law of the State.

First. That the election laws are defective and lead to fraud, and should be materially amended, and that he will exercise his influence to that end.

Second. That the collection of the taxes next November postponed until the first of March, 1872, and not enforce the penalty for non-payment until that time.

Finally, the committee recommended the following suggestions:—The Legislature ensuring the full payment of the royalty on the phosphates; the repeal of the acts granting exclusive franchises; a stop to be put to the drawing of money from the Treasury for alleged Legislative expenses.
