The laborers finding themselves closely pressed fired several shots into the crowd. and wounded a miner very seriously -Now a hot chase commenced, the laborers retreating towards Kiser's Valley, and the pursuers gaining new accessions every moment, in men, women, and boys. Back of Briggs' shaft a stand was made, and six of the "blacklegs" were woundedto the rescue too late to be of any help. They returned to Scranton, taking two of the wounded men with them.

The bodies of three murdered laborers were found this morning in a swamp near Briggs' shaft. 

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
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
