

INCIDENTS OF THE PLAGUE AT BUENOS AYRES.

The terrible plague, which has been prevailing at Buenos Ayres for some time, appears to be abating. It is the opinion of the American Consul that not less than 30,000 perished, and still at the latest dates, the carnival of death had not ceased, though the deaths daily were considerably diminished. But fourteen Americans have fallen victims. A correspondent of the New York Herald gives the following:

The most extraordinary tales are now being narrated by eye-witnesses of the scenes related, and continually finding their way to the public prints, and may one day form a ghastly literature of the plague. Among those current are the following half-dozen incidents which have gone the rounds of the press, most of them being vouched for, but forming only specimen cases from among the thousands that have occurred:

In March last a confectioner broke open his coffin while being carried to the South Cemetery, and, feeling faint, weak and horrified, rushed into a neighboring pulperia for a glass of brandy. After drinking it he said to the pulpero, "I cannot pay you, as I have no money; I have just broken out of my coffin." Every occupant of the house fled as though a fury was pursuing them. A street messenger, carrying a empty coffin on his head, enters a grog-shop, and putting the coffin on the counter, drinks till he falls to the floor, and is carried away with the coffin. An engine driver on the Northern Railway line was lying in agony on his bed. Suddenly he starts up and rushes from the house a maniac. He meets a fellow-workman, and tells him, "I am going to catch my train." His comrade took him to his house, but he died two hours after reaching it. In the cemetery, a class of poor alleyway tenement houses, the mortality was dreadful, and as many as seventy dead bodies are reported to have been taken from one of these fever dens, and the scavenger carts were employed in the removal of the corpses, sometimes actually breaking down from the weight. At one time coffins were publicly hawked or peddled about the streets, and later the Popular Commission distributed them gratuitously to the poor. One day a man came up and asked for a coffin from the Commission to bury a dead relative. The burial case was furnished, and two days later he appeared and asked for a coffin for the same person as the first one asked for. It finally turned out that he had, with some acquaintances, been indulging in a drunken spree, leaving the relative unburied. At last one of the acquaintances died of fever, and his body was promptly put into a coffin; "and now," said he, "we are going to bury both together."

In the haste of flight from the city many houses were abandoned, with all their contents, and at once the thieves set up a profitable business by watching their opportunities and carting away all the furniture and other effects. This has occurred in scores of instances, and the police now hold large number of keys of abandoned dwellings. During Holy Week, which terminated April 9, the plague reached its extreme violence, and it was at that time that coffins, or rather simple boxes, were peddled in the streets. At this time also the new cemetery at the Chacarita was opened, and the workmen who were employed as grave diggers actually pursued their ghastly calling by the light of lanterns far into the night, being unable to enter the bodies as fast as they arrived during the day. It may interest many persons also to learn that among these grave diggers and mortuary laborers there was a smaller ratio of deaths than among any other class of people.

Relief of a substantial description is still being freely sent in by our neighboring South American cities, and there still is a large need of aid. Montevideo has forwarded fully \$50,000 in cash alone.
