than Southern Clubs. The interests of agri ulture are so immense and are so vitally connected with the welfare and prosperity of the whole country, that it is a matter of great surprise so little attention has been given it by our law makers generally. The impression appears to prevail largely amongst farmers that their interests and the interests of the community at large can best be subserved by sending lawyers and other professional men to the legislature. In compliance with this idea, comparatively few farmers are selected, and as a natural result, agriculture has come to be regarded as a matter of secondary importance, so far as legislation is concerned.

It is proper that a certain number of able lawyers should be sent to the legislature, but it is proper also that the farm ing interest shall be largely represented. The fact that we have not had more of this class in our legislative halls, is due mainly to the prevailing impression that farmers are not educated for the purpose. This is an error. If the cultivators of the soil will forage these political preferences, and select from their own class men of intelligence, ripe experience, and superior judgment-and there are plenty of such in every county in the Statethey will soon find that the claims of their profession will be properly respected Lawyers are theatrical; farmers are practical, and it is the engrafting of more of the practical into our legislation that is now demanded. This will never be done until farmers properly estimate their own importance, and the importance of agriculture.

The sooner, therefore, that the cultivators of the soil take the position that they are, by virtue of numbers and in the the magnitude of the interests involved in agriculture, entitled to a full and fair share of legislative representation, the better it will be for all parties. Let them agree to send as representatives men of known practical ability and thorough integrity, and they can accomplish it without the least difficulty.

Another good result that would be certain to follow such a course, would be the driving out from our legislative halls the political charlatans who have no in terests to subserve but their own, or those of the party to which they belong more capable of determining what legis. at all times: lation is best adapted to promote the gen- SUGAR, COFFEE, TEA. eral welfare and prosperity.

We hope to see this matter taken up and discussed in the North, as it is being done in the South. Nothing but good can come from it, even if they do not determine to send men of their own class Confectioneries, Nuts, &c., to assist in making laws.
