In corn there is but little doing; sales of 4000 bush at 60 1/2c for yellow, the former for new, and 7 1/2c for green mixed.—Oats meet a limited demand, with sales of 6100 bush at 50 1/2c for western white, and 48 for mixed.

The better descriptions of Beef Cattle were in good request this morning at an advance, but the medium and low grades were extremely slow to move, and prices for the most part nominal. We quote choice at 6 1/2c; fair to good at 5 1/2c and common at 4 1/2c @ 5 lb. gross. Receipts, 200 head.
Cows and Calves were extremely slow to move, but prices were steady. Sales of springers at \$4 1/2 @ \$5, and fresh cows at \$4 @ \$5. Receipts, 150 head.
Hogs commanded very full figures, and the demand was quite urgent. Sales of common and good country fed at 6 1/2c @ 7 lb. gross. Receipts, 4 head for the Union and 1500 head at the Avenue Droze yards.

PROCLAMATION.—Whereas the Hon. JAMES H. GRASMAN, President Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of the 9th Judicial District, composed of the counties of Juniata, Perry and Cumberland, and the Hon. THOMAS J. MILLER and SAMUEL WATTS, Judges of the Court of Common Pleas of Juniata county, have issued their precept to me directed, bearing date the 8th day of Sept. A. D. 1871, for holding a Court of Oyer and Terminer and General J. J. Delivery, and General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, at Millintown, on the first MONDAY of December, 1871, being the 4th day of the month; NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the Coroner, Justices of the Peace and Constables of the county of Juniata, that they be then and there in their proper persons, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon of said day, with records, inquisitions, examinations and other remembrances, to do those things that to their offices respectively appertain, and those that are bound by recognition to prosecute against the prisoners that are or then may be in the Jail of said county of Juniata, be then and there to prosecute against them as shall be just.

By an Act of Assembly, passed the 8th day of May, A. D. 1854, it is made the duty of the Justices of the Peace of the several counties of this Commonwealth to return to the Clerk of the Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace, of the respective counties, all the recognizances entered into before them by any person or persons charged with the commission of any crime, except such cases as may be entered into ten days before the commencement of the session of the Court to which they are made returnable respectively, and in all cases where any recognizances are entered into ten days before the commencement of the session to which they are made returnable, the said Justices are required to return the same in the same manner as if said act had not been passed.
