

FARM AND HOUSEHOLD.

THRIFT.

In passing through the country, why is it that we see only a few farmers that seem to be well fenced, and on which the dwellings and other farm buildings are in good repair? These few farms are always free from weeds, and invariably yield good crops of all kinds. The owner of these premises attend to their business of farming. They get their crops in at the proper season, and harvest them when they are properly matured. Their cash account is always in their favor, the balance being on the right side. They have no time to waste at the tavern or groceries. If they have spare time, it is devoted to reading and self culture. They always subscribe, and pay for their local paper first, and others are not discarded. They and their families are well informed upon the current topics of the day. Their children are educated, well clad, and well bred. These men are the substantial and influential men of the town. They keep it respectable. They support the schools and the churches.—These are the men to whom the country ever looks in time of need. They always have opinions on the subjects, and their views are never in market. Ever open to conviction, never to corruption, they may sometimes be a little exclusive, but they are ever ready to assist their less favored neighbors to rise to the same plain upon which they stand. They are respected but true, cautious but sure, and they constitute the hope and the safety of our republic.

GET LEATHER BITS.

One of the cruellest things done to dumb beasts is putting hard frozen iron bits into a horse's mouth. It is not only a painful but a dangerous act. For every time living flesh touches mental metal below the freezing point, the latter extracts the heat from the former and freezes it. Thus a horse's mouth becomes frozen to these bits, for several times a day put into it each time causing the freezing to go deeper, to end at last in extensive ulcerations. With such a sore mouth the poor horse refuses to eat and pines away which kills the horse doctor in. They call it bits glaniers, horse all, etc., and go to cramping down poisonous drugs, in doses, and the next you know of the poor abused creature, he is to be trotted off to be food for fish or crows. Many a valuable horse has been "mysteriously" lost in just that way. Thinking and humane people avoid this by first warming the bits to avoid this too much trouble, and sometimes impossible, as in night work, like staging and physician's work. Now all this trouble is entirely avoided, as we have found on large trial, by getting the harness makers to get leather bits for winter use, so made that no metal substance can touch the flesh. They are durable and cost only half a dollar. We would not exchange ours for a gold one if it could be replaced. Don't fail to try it.—Rural World.

TO KEEP CELLARS FROM FREEZING.

The following method for obtaining the desirable feature is given by the *Sericulture American*. The experiment was tried by a gentleman with the cellar of an out house, in which, on several occasions, vegetables have frozen, although the cellar was fortified against frost by a process known to farmers as banking.—The walls and ceiling were pasted over with four or five thickness of old newspapers, a curtain of the material being also pasted over the same low windows on the top of the cellar. The papers were pasted to the bare joints over the head having an air space between them and the floor. He reports that the papers carried his roof through last winter, though the cellar was left unbanked, and he is confident they have made the cellar frost proof. We do not need the special use of old newspapers for this purpose. It is just as well, or better, to use coarse brown paper. Whatever paper is employed, it will be necessary to sweep down the walls thoroughly, and to use a very strong size to hold the stones. It is not necessary to press the paper down into all the depressions of the wall, every airspace beneath it is an additional defense against the cold.

JUDGE L... of Lafayette, Indiana, not only dispense Justice with wit and even hand, but at times indulgeth in the joke. During the progress of a certain trial involving the ownership of a calf, it became of importance that the jury, in order to arrive at a just conclusion, should be sent to view for themselves the chattel in dispute. The plaintiff, who had the animal in charge, lived some two miles from the courthouse, and one of the elderly jurors demurred to the idea of it being sent for. The judge, in his usual, full voice, replied: "Gentlemen, I anticipated this objection, and had the calf brought to the courtyard.
