HOW TO GET A GOOD WHEAT CROP.

Frederick Watts, Commissioner of Agriculture, in a recent letter says:—"The experience of many years has led me to the conclusion that the deterioration of the wheat crop is mainly attributable to the improper and untimely use of barnyard manure. In our practice the clover sod is turned down and platted with corn. The ground is again ploughed in the spring and sowed with oats and upon the stubble of this crop all the manure of the barnyard is put; then ploughed again and sowed with wheat. This delicate plant is thus subjected to the rawness and grossness of barnyard food, with all its germs of flies, worms, lice, and bugs—forming a sufficient cause of the unsuccessful growth of a grain so pure and delicate as wheat. Corn is the hog of plants, and will devour plants of any quality, and thrive upon it. Here, then, upon the sod to be ploughed for corn is the place for the barnyard manure. Bury it deep, and when the corn is cut off, break the stubble even with the ground during the winter. In the spring harrow the ground well, sow your oats upon it, and drill it. You will thus keep your manure where you put it, and not subject the oat crop to be thrown down by it. When this crop is removed, bring your manure to the surface by deep plowing and thorough tillage. The barnyard manure, having thus received proper preparation, is a fit food for the wheat plant. Experience has taught me this lesson. On my farm in Pennsylvania I never fail to raise a satisfactory crop of wheat, and I have known no such thing as a midge, Hessian fly, or army worm."

SPENDING HORSES' FEET.—It is almost impossible to get horses shod without having the frogs cut away. All veterinary surgeons, all horsemen, all leading blacksmiths, agree that the frog should not be pared one particle—nor even trimmed. No matter how pliable and soft the frog is, cut it away smooth on all sides, and in two days it will be dry and hard as a chip. You might as well cut off all the leaves of trees, and expect them to flourish, as to pare away the frog and have a healthy foot. The rough, spongy part of the frog is to the foot what leaves are to the tree—the lungs.

Never have a red hot shoe put upon the foot to burn it level. If you can find a blacksmith that is mechanic enough to level the foot without a red hot iron, employ him. The burning process deadens the hoof and tends to contract it. If you do not think so, try the red hot poker on your finger nail, and see if it will not affect the growth of that.

There are many important points in shoeing horses, but these two are of more importance than all the rest, level to the apprehension of men not skilled in horses, and the two most disregarded.—Morror and Farmer.

FAILURE IN FARMING.—As a general thing, when ordinary industry and judgment are exercised in the business of farming, success, to a greater or lesser extent, is certain. REMEDY FOR SICK SHOULDERS.—A correspondent of the Canada Farmer writes relative to sore or galled shoulders of horses:—"Wash them well every night and morning with a strong solution of oak bark, made by boiling the bark in water; then rub them well with linseed oil. Anoint them every night and morning with a salve made of three parts of lard and one part of quick-lime.—To make horses' shoulders tough, wash the shoulder well twice a day, for a week before working, with the oak bark solution."

CHOLERA.—First drink one half pint of pure Cognac brandy. Then every fifteen minutes after, take one tablespoonful of a mixture made of one half ounce each of gum myrrh, Cayenne pepper and camphor, in a pint of pure Cognac, for the first hour. It will cure either the gripes or colic instantly.

TO BLEACH CLOTHES.—One ounce of oxalic acid to a pint of water; a tumbler of this to three gallons of water. Put in the clothes; stir it well; then rinse twice. To whiten brown cloth, boil in weak lye, and expose day and night to the sun and night air; keep the clothes well sprinkled.

CURE FOR DRUNKENNESS.—Sulphate iron, five grains; magnesia, ten grains; peppermint water, ten drachms; spirits of nutmeg, one drachm; take it twice a day. It is a tonic, a stimulant, etc., and never fails to cure drunkenness in a short time.

TO TAKE INK OUT OF LINEN.—Scald in hot tallow. Let it cool; then wash in warm soda. Sometimes these stains can be removed by wetting the place in very sour buttermilk or lemon juice; rub salt over, and bleach in the sun.

HEALING SALVE.—Mutton tallow, four lbs.; bees wax, one pound; resin, half a pound; turpentine, three ounces. Melt the three first over a slow fire; then add the turpentine when nearly cold.
