WHAT A HEAVY SOD WILL DO.

The sod makes the corn. This may be taken as an axiom, as undoubted as that a straight line is the shorest distance between two points. If the sod is right the corn can take care of itself. What is wanted is a mass of roots, filling the soil to the depth of three, four, or five inches or more, and such a mat of vegetation on the surface as will inevitably at all times: belong to such a mass of roots. 


