PROFITS OF HONEY.

At a recent convention of bee culturists, held in Cleveland, Ohio, some statistics of the profits of honey raising were elicited which were rather amazing. For instance, Mr. Quimby, a noted beekeeper at St. Jonsville, N. Y., had 15,000 pounds of surplus honey from 200 swarms of box hives the largest yield was over 200 pounds. This honey was of the very best quality, being made from white clover blossoms. Mr. Hooper, of Janesville, Minn., said that he took six tons of honey from 72 swarms, together with their increase, during the season. This honey was mostly made in the time of the clover bloom, or in about twelve days of July. This is a good yield, 18,000 pounds from 75 swarms is an average of 160 pounds per hive. Two women were mentioned as taking part in the proceedings, and were quite experienced at the business; one of them in this her first season had sold 1,200 pounds of honey. The keeping of bees seems to be a business in which women can engage with fair prospects of success. We know personally one young lady in Illinois who manages 100 hives which yield \$10 income each per year, or \$1,000 for the whole. Other young ladies might do the same, by beginning with one swarm and then taking care of the increase or future progeny. Mr. Quimby states that in New York City alone a quarter million pounds of Northern honey are sold yearly (we believe this estimate very low) and the bee pasturage is so large he thought 40,000,000 pounds could be produced in New York State alone. A row of bee hives near a farmer's barn or house will bring him as much income in the course of a year as his flocks of poultry; and it is attention to such little things as these that bring in the extra dollars and cents, to make home happy with additional comforts.

THE FRANKLIN CREAMERY.

This is probably the largest creamery in New York State. At present, the milk of eight hundred and fifty cows is handled every day. One day last month the creamery turned out one thousand two hundred and eighty-eight pounds of butter, and one thousand five hundred pounds of cheese; one ton of cheese and seven hundred and seventy-five pounds of butter per day is the ordinary work. The average amount of milk received daily is twenty thousand nine hundred and eighty-one pounds. It is located in Franklin, eleven miles from the line of the Albany and Susquehanna Railroad. The building is nicely finished, thirty-eight by sixty feet, with a wing twenty-eight by forty four feet; two stories high, and in part three stories high, with rooms for dwelling; water vat room for rising cream, twenty-four by thirty-eight feet; four six hundred gallon cheese vats, thirty presses, sixteen churns, carried by a six horse power portable machine. It was established in the spring of 1867, and is now operating on its fourth season. Butter and cheese is manufactured by the pound, at three cents for butter and two cents for cheese, and patrons pay all expenses for packages, salt, &c. for butter; boxes, bandages, amatto, &c. for cheese. The net proceeds to the patrons have compared favorably with the other system of dairying, and it will probably continue to do so, unless the system should become so general as to over-supply the summer market for butter, and flood the country with too many skimmed cheeses, which is quite likely to happen.—N. Y. Observer.

THE COUNTRY GARDEN.

The Country Gardener gives the following remedy for painful wounds: Take a pan or shovel with burning coals and sprinkle them with common brown sugar, and hold the wounded part in the smoke. In a few minutes the pain will be allayed and recovery proceeds rapidly. In my own case a rusty nail had made a bad wound in the bottom of my foot. The pain and nervous irritation was severe. This was all removed by holding it in the smoke for fifteen minutes, and I was able to resume my reading in comfort. We have often recommended it to others with like results. Last week one of my men had a finger nail torn out by a pair of ice tongs. It became very painful as was to have been expected. The pain ceased, and it promises speedy recovery.

WHAT WASHINGTON KNEW ABOUT FARMING.

What Washington knew about farming was worth knowing. In 1787 he had five hundred and eighty acres in grass; sowed six hundred bushels of oats seven hundred acres of wheat, and as much more in corn, barley, potatoes, beans, peas, &c., and one hundred and fifty with turnips. His stock consisted of one hundred and forty horses; one hundred and twelve cows; two hundred and thirty-six working oxen, heifers, and steers, and five hundred sheep. He constantly employed two hundred and fifty hands, and kept twenty-four plows going during the whole year, when the earth and the state of the weather would permit. In 1780 he slaughtered one hundred and fifty hogs for the use of his own family, and provisions for his negroes.
