SUPPOSED MURDER.—The Reading (Pa.) Eagle of Saturday evening a week contained the following particulars of the supposed murder of John Simpson, of this city:

"An excitement was created in Hamburg last night by the disappearance of John Simpson, of Lancaster, a well-known agent for farm implements. He went to Hamburg for the purpose of collecting a number of bills. He stopped at the American House, and about dark started for the residence of Henry Geeske, in a buggy, who resides 2 miles above Hamburg, towards Port Clinton. During the evening his horse returned home with the buggy and with one of the lines cut about a foot back of the bridle, but Mr. Simpson was missing. A search was made for the man, and about one mile up the pike, within the limits of the borough, where the road rises thirty feet above the canal, and at a stone quarry, Simpson's coat was found with a hole in it, made by the stab of a knife, which indicated that the man had been murdered and his body thrown into the canal. His pocket book was found in close proximity to the coat. A number of papers of no value and a ticket for Harrisburg were found in it, but there was no money. When he started from the hotel he had about \$600 with him, and said that if he succeeded in collecting a bill that evening, he would be able to pay a note of \$700. He gave the hostler a dollar before he started off. The ground around where the coat was found showed evidence of a struggle. The case was placed before the District Attorney, who ordered Chief Callen and Detective Lyon to inquire into the matter."

"A correspondent states that this morning a large number of citizens of Hamburg went out to make a thorough search for the body. Footprints have been found leading into the canal, at the side of the turnpike, where the coat was found."

A telegram received in this city on Monday morning, from Jacob Simpson, ex-Policeman and a brother to the missing man, states that the body has not yet been recovered.

Dr. Dewees, one of the best authorities in obstetrics, has argued in one of his publications, that pain in childbirth is a morbid symptom; that it is a perversion of nature, caused by modes of living not consistent with the most healthy condition of the system; and that such a regimen as should insure such a completely healthy condition might be counted on with certainty to do away with such pain.

In 1841 there was privately printed in England, a small pamphlet of twenty-two pages, in which a gentleman who was a chemist, gave an account of an experiment he himself tried in the case of his wife, whose labors had been so excessively painful that there was much reason to fear she could not survive the next day. The result was so favorable that he felt it his duty to publish it, with his name and residence. A few experiments were made in Boston and vicinity, carrying out the theory of the author of the pamphlet alluded to, which had a distinguished success. The book before us is a more full exposition of the principles of the pamphlet, which is now out of print. PHILADELPHIA, MAY 14, 1872. Flour.—The market is very firm, and the demand continues fair from the house consumers. Shippers, however, are not operating. The receipts as well as the stocks are very moderate. The market closed very dull with the above range of prices.

Cows and calves meet a moderate demand at full figures. Sales of springers at \$50a55 and fresh cows at \$65a75.

SHEEP were in steady demand and prices well maintained. Sales of clipped at 57c to 70c for to clip, and \$5 to \$7 for common, and woolled at 78c to 80c. Lambs are wanted at \$2a\$3 per head for good, \$2a4 for common.
