An adjourned meeting of Huntingdon Presbytery was held in the Presbyterian Church in this place on Tuesday, the 11th inst., at 11 o'clock, Rev. Mr. Pri deaux presiding. Mr. Zanier delivered the charge to the Pastor, and Dr. McLean delivered the charge to the people.

An evening session of Presbytery was held for the transaction of other business, after which it adjourned.

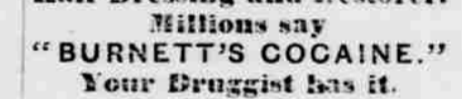
