The County Printing—The Announced Decision of the Commissioners—A Change of the Law Needed.

Last week we stated that the Commissioners of this county called to their office the publishers of the Register, the Sentinel, and the Republican, on the 10th inst., for the purpose of ascertaining the circulation of said papers within the county...

It was not believed that the Commissioners would receive such a list as bona fide subscribers. They did; and if they ginned it, it was because there were objections made to their receiving it...

Their decision was not rendered as Justice is supposed to render here—blindfolded, so that she cannot see any of the parties in the contest, so that she may be governed only by the principles of right and honor as they are made clear by evidence.

They seemed in as great a hurry to push the case to a conclusion without evidence—for they scarcely allowed the time that was asked to make out a list of subscribers from the subscription books to be placed on file in their own office...

The failure to specify the duration or the length of time that the decision of the Commissioners shall remain in force may have appeared unintentionally, and it may have been intended to appear just as it does.

These custodians of the public affairs of the county should issue another proclamation for the triple purpose of manufacturing patronage for their organs, and to clearly set before the minds of the public for what length of time their decision or decree shall remain in force...

It is high time that the people of Juniata county put into that office a set of men of a different grade. A change is needed. We want men who have minds and judgments of their own. We want men who have moral firmness enough to keep themselves steadily in the course of justice...

If we had the opportunity of doing all the public printing needed in the whole Commonwealth, we would not accept it if it had to be obtained as the Republican obtained the public printing of this county.

Explosion in New Jersey. A LOGWOOD EXTRACTOR BLOWN UP IN MILLVILLE—TWO PERSONS KILLED. The town of Millville, Cumberland county, was the scene, a few days since, of terrific explosion, which cost two fine young men their lives.

According to the eye-witnesses the great bulk shot up in the air some five hundred feet, until it looked no bigger than a good sized pumpkin. Then down it came, crashing clean through a pile of three-inch planking six planks high, which was located about two hundred and fifty feet from the scene of explosion.

Steamboat Explosion. MARSEILLES, FRANCE, June 16.—While the Spanish steamship Guadayaqa was lying in this port to-day, with passengers on board, her boilers exploded, and the entire upper portion of the ship was torn to pieces.

Dear Kiss—Fierce Assault. CINCINNATI, June 17.—The Rev. Mr. Thompson, of the M. E. Church, Leavenworth, formerly of this city, in bidding his friends good bye this morning, attempted to kiss a young lady, whereupon her sweetheart, named Brown, who was present, ran out and got a hatchet and cut Thompson in the head and shoulder, inflicting a wound from which he cannot possibly recover.

The State Temperance Convention met at Altoona, on Friday last, and nominated the following ticket: Governor, S. B. Chase, of Susquehanna county; Supreme Judge, Joseph Henderson, of Washington county; Auditor General, Barr Spangler, of Lancaster county; Congressmen at large, Col. Geo. F. McFarland, A. J. Clark, and B. Rush Bradford.

The raft boat McDonald exploded her boiler, on Saturday last, when nearly opposite North McGregor, Iowa. About 35 persons were on board, a number of whom were killed and wounded, but the exact number is not known.

The drying house connected with the powder-mill above St. Clair, Pa., exploded on the 11th. The cause is unknown. Fortunately nobody was hurt the men being all away at dinner. The house is a complete wreck.

Letter from South Carolina.

CHARLESTON, May 30, 1872. MR. EDITOR—This is "Memorial Day," but how much it differs from that day about which we last wrote you. On that day business houses were closed from 12 o'clock M.—to-day business is as brisk as on any other day.

By the way, we might add that very few bells tolled on the "Confederate Memorial Day." Ask the people here the reason, and they are not ashamed to tell you. They have very few bells—but three in all the city—the fire bell, and the bell on the Orphan House, and the chimes on St. Michael's, which were sent to England for safety, and brought back at the close of the war.

But after all, our Union dead were remembered to-day. Few white people were there, but a great crowd of colored citizens. This seems strange, since it is known that we have here many Northerners who pass for strong Unionists at home.

It is estimated that 350,000 feet of lumber will be required at the State Fair grounds in the erection of temporary buildings, fences, stalls, etc. An editor says that the only reason he knew of why his house was not blown away the other day during a severe gale was because there was a heavy mortgage upon it.

Charles E. Staples, aged 18, has been held in \$5000 bail to answer the charge of kindling the forest fires which raged in Franklin and Medary counties, Mass., a few weeks since.

A burglar entered a house at Westport, Conn., recently, and finding a pair of elder, drank so freely that he became drowsy, and at daylight next morning was found asleep on the premises.

A blind man at Fort Wayne, Ind., was recently married to a blind woman in the presence of three other blind persons. The question is, were there any witnesses?

Some men when blasting rocks in Bowling Green, Ky., turned seventeen hundred rattlesnakes out of their beds. They gathered together for a jubilee rehearsal, but, from circumstances over which they had no control, will not be held.

A California paper reports that a hotel chambermaid laid aside her broom a few days ago, and on calling for a settlement, told her employer she had been dabbling in stocks for a year or more and had something more than \$200,000 as a result.

California has eight million sheep. The fruit crop of Illinois promises to be large. Florida is introducing the Mexican bread fruit.

Minnesota farmers are turning their attention to the peanut crop. Snow still remains in the vicinity of Mount Blue, Maine.

Six cases of sunstroke occurred in New York on Thursday the 13th. Frederick Douglass lost \$15,000 in bonds by the destruction of his house.

A woman in Harrisburg has been fined \$10 for cutting off flowers in a cemetery. There is not a whisky shop in Salem, N. C., and there has been but one fire there for ninety years.

Farmers on the James river, below Richmond, Va., have already begun to cut their wheat. Nearly one million dollars' worth of lard has been exported from this country within the last six months.

Sanitists say that the sunflower has the remarkable property of purifying the air laden with marsh miasma. Miss Tennie C. Claflin was elected colonel of the Eighty-fifth N. Y. (colored) Regiment on Thursday night, the 13th.

It is said that more ice houses are struck by lightning along the Hudson river than any other class of buildings. A stylish bonnet can be obtained from Paris for \$125. Indulgent husbands will cut this out to show to their wives.

Koopmanschap, the coolie importer, so famous some time since, has failed for \$200,000. Accra \$100,000, in Chinese notes of hand. Circus companies are reaping an immense harvest throughout the country.

One hundred of the 148 pews in the Presbyterian church at Oylestown were rented two weeks ago, the price ranging from \$40 down to \$4.

A Brooklyn lady tripped her foot in her hoops the other day while stepping out of a car and fell heavily upon her infant child, crushing it, it is believed fatally.

A curious case of spontaneous combustion is noted in Reading, Penn. A gentleman after oiling some woodwork, left the piece of flannel he had used in a bowl with a small quantity of linseed oil, and placed it on the second story balcony in the open air, intending to use them again.

From the brass of the bell of the late Chicago court house something like a hundred million "charms" have been made and sold. The bell must have weighed more than two thousand pounds or ten times as much as the Moscow tinker.

In view of the success of this scheme, a Wisconsin paper suggests that the bell on Mrs. Leary's cow be manufactured into court-house bells, and declares it would make one for each court-house in the country. There is no limit to Chicago enterprise and expansion.

Phillip D. Banks, mail robber, who was arrested at Cloverda, Iowa, April 30, was sentenced by Judge Lane, in the United States District Court, to ten years hard labor in the Iowa penitentiary. Before the sentence Banks made a piteous appeal for mercy, stating that he had a wife and five children depending on him for support, and that he had been in service as a mail carrier for twenty-two years, and had never tampered with the mail until about a year ago, when in a fit of drunkenness, he committed the first crime.

An Indiana farmer, after trying to trap poison and shoot the rats that overrun his premises, bought two goats and gave them range of yards and stables. Within a week every rat emigrated and stayed away until the goats were sold nearly two years after. A second edition of goats were procured, and since then not a rat has been seen on the premises. The goats are not supposed to play rat terrier, but on the contrary the rats seem the goats; it is too much for them.

The members of the avul chorus are on the strike. Mr. Gilmore has been putting them through their rehearsals, and the scene is described as a peculiarly striking one. The hundred firemen were arrayed in black pants, red shirts with red collars and natty white caps with red cords and tassels.

Flake's Bulletin, of Galveston, Texas, says: "Several experiments have been made during a number of years back to supply the principle cities of the east with fresh beef packed in this State. Similar attempts have been made to introduce into the English market the cheap meats, in a fresh condition, of Australia and South America. But these meats have, so far failed to become popular. It is rather a severe commentary upon the boasted civilization of the age and the ingenuity of mankind that, while millions of people are suffering in one quarter of the globe for cheap meat, millions of dollars' worth of cattle are annually destroyed simply for their hides, horns and bones."

A touching incident is reported from Chattanooga, Tenn. An utter stranger called on a respectable farmer last week and asked him if his house had not been robbed during the war. The farmer replied that it had. "I," said the stranger, "was one of the marauding party that did it. I took a little silver locket." "That locket," said the farmer, bursting into tears, "had been worn by my dear, dear child." "Here it is," replied the stranger, visibly affected, "I am rich; let me make restitution; here are \$20 for your little son." He gave the farmer a \$50 bill, and received \$30 in change. He then wrung the farmer's hand warmly and left. The farmer has since dried his tears and loaded his shot gun. The \$50 was his.
