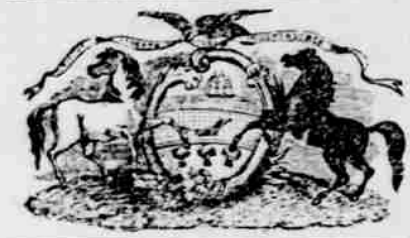

Result of the Election in North Carolina - 1,800 to 2,500 Majority for Caldwell. WASHINGTON, August 17. - The following letter was received here yesterday from the Governor of North Carolina:

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA, RALEIGH, AUGUST 13, 1872. - E. FORBES, Esq. - Sir: Your telegram asking for a copy of the certificate of the Secretary of State as to the result of the election for governor was received at eleven o'clock last night. In reply I have to say that our election law provides that the returns shall be made sealed up to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, to be opened by him in the presence of the two houses of the General Assembly, on the first Tuesday after the organization of said houses. Our Legislature does not convene until the third Monday in November, hence it is impossible to get a certificate from the Secretary of State until the result is declared by the Speaker of the House, as the returns cannot be opened by any one except him and he must do it on a certain day in the presence of the two houses. There are some fifteen counties yet to be heard from. Except partial returns the most heard from are semi-official, and it is pretty satisfactorily ascertained that Caldwell's majority will range from 1,800 to 2,500. Very respectfully, T. B. CALDWELL.

A riot has broken out in Belfast, Ireland. Fighting in the streets is frequent and it is stated that on Sunday night stones fell in the streets like hail. Riflemen with pistols in their hands, parade the city, and whole sections are given up to the rioters. The military, at latest accounts yesterday, were charging the mob and it was reported that martial law would be declared. Formidable riots have also broken out at Lurgan, Ulster county, and in other quarters.
