SUICIDE, OR PROBABLE MURDER IN LEWIS TOWNSHIP.—The following are the reports that have come to us in regard to an occurrence that has shown the upper end of this county into an intense state of excitement:

On Friday week, Mrs. Mary Ann Schell, wife of Jacob Schell residing in the upper end of Lewis township, about three-quarters of a mile east of Brass' tavern stand, now owned by the Snyder brothers, went to a Mr. Robenold's, two and one-half miles from her residence, to assist in boiling apple butter.

On Saturday afternoon following she left Robenold's to return home. Not coming home on Saturday evening, as was expected by the family, two of her sons were sent, on Sunday morning, to discover what had detained her. After they had gone about a quarter of a mile they discovered her in a hollow in the woods hanging on a tree.

A part of her clothing (her drawers) had been used in hanging her. The alarm was given and a large number of neighbors and friends were attracted to the spot. A jury was summoned by Abm Wagner, Justice of the Peace, of Turbutville. A physician from Turbutville made an examination and gave it as his opinion that no violence had been inflicted by a second party—that it was a case of suicide.

A Muncy physician made an examination after the body had been taken down and conveyed to her home. He gave it as his opinion that she had been choked to death by some unknown person before she had been hung up, as several marks of violence were found on different parts of her body.

Small particles of leaves and sticks were found on her face, which would seem to indicate that she had been killed and left lying on the ground, and afterwards hung up to avoid suspicion. One of her sons says that just before he came to the spot where he discovered his mother hanging, he saw a man with a gun running away from the place.

When she left Robenold's she was given a crock of apple butter and a small bucket of lard. The former was spilled at several places near where the body was found, and the ground showed signs of a scuffle. There are various opinions as to who the murderer was, and in reference to this unfortunate occurrence.
