Oh! do not weep, but dry your tears, In pain he suffered many years. He suffered hard, he suffered long, But now he sings an angel's song.

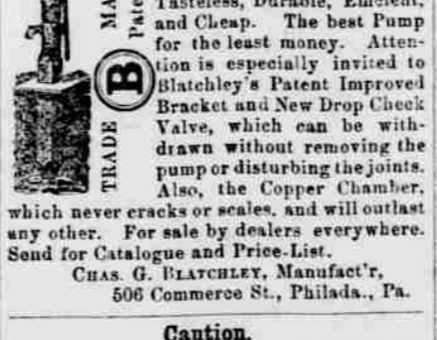
