Training Colts.

For the last six years, says a correspondent of the Prairie Farmer, I have been harnessing my colts when about one week old, and when the mother is work of the colts are tied by her side. I find many advantages in beginning so soon with them, among which are, the colts is taught to lead in a few minutes—seldom more than fifteen. Being thus early handled, they have no fear of being hurt when any one comes near them. They learn to travel on the road without fear of the vehicle behind them or meeting others. There is no danger of losing them or having them slip on the road to cause you to go back after them. Two or three teams going back after a colt will break one to lead by the side of the mother. When so trained they are ready to work as soon as they are old enough. I have two that were no trouble to break. All that they had to learn was to pull. They knew what was behind and had no fear of being hurt. One I harnessed with an assistance, and drove seven miles, and back the first afternoon. Neither of these colts has ever been a trouble to harness, but they are now a very pleasant team to drive in any place, or to any kind of carriage. Kindness in all cases is necessary in training—I do not say breaking—colts, and firmness is quite as necessary. In early training a young colt will very soon learn that man is his master, and that he will not be hurt if he is quiet. The colt learns a little at a time, and learns that little well and he never forgets it. In beginning with colts old enough to work they are expected to learn so much at once. A colt should not be expected to learn all that he is to know at one time. Try the plan of leading the colt when the mother is at work this spring.

Bees and Melons.

Last season afforded a very light crop of squashes and melons. The failure was attributed by gardeners to there being no bees to facilitate the blossoms by carrying the pollen from the male to the female blossoms. If the vines are trained so that the pollen would fall on the bearing blossoms, they would not blight. Last season I placed boxes, about a foot in height, around the hills of my melons and neglected to remove those around six hills until the vines had run over them so much that it could not be done without injury to the plants. I had a good yield from these six hills, all the melons being inside of the boxes; while the other hills with vines running on the level ground did not yield fruit.

CURE FOR BRUISES.—Scalds and burns which are not much more than skin deep are instantly relieved of pain by using an application made of oil and lime water. Four water on a lump of unslacked lime; as soon as it is clear, stir in sweet oil until it is as thick as thick cream, by shaking, and apply it freely at the time, and subsequently as often as any discomfort arises. If boiling water is poured on the lime-sock, it will clear in a few minutes. Good druggists all ways keep lime water on hand. Families would do well to keep a bottle of the mixture always on hand; it will keep a year, and can be taken and used at a moment's notice, the natural skin growing again without a scar, and without the inconvenient labor of taking of flour.

HOUSES WITH GOOD DISPOSITIONS.—A correspondent of the Western Herald gives the following directions:—A horse that is full between the eyes will be true and kind, unless he has been badly fooled, for a balky driver will spoil any horse. A horse that is concave between the eyes, or flat and narrow between the eyes, has a fretful, impatient disposition. A bump between the ears on top of the head denotes fire, if it rise abrupt and high, on the sides next the ears, if low, the opposite temperament. If you want a horse with a good disposition select one with a full or convex head, wide between the eyes, and you can depend upon it he will not balk with proper treatment.

DYSENTERY.—The following simple remedy has been known to cure the most obstinate cases of Dysentery, when other remedies had failed. It has the merit of being harmless and almost always effectual:—Take one fourth of a pint of hot water; vinegar, half pint. Mix. Now add common salt as long as it will dissolve in the mixture, stirring it freely.—Give for an adult one table-spoonful every hour until the bloody discharges cease, or until it operates freely upon the bowels.

WARTS ON COWS.—A correspondent observes; allow me to say that among many remedies, the easiest and surest is muriatic acid. After milking, cut off several of the warts, applying a stick dipped in the acid to each, and there is an end of them. The cow will not wince at the next milking. Dozens may be entirely removed in as many days without risk or trouble.
