

Strange Adventure.

A MAN HEARD FROM AFTER SEVEN MONTHS' INVOLUNTARY ABSENCE. The New York World says: On the 6th of last December a young man, residing in Brooklyn, named J. E. Van Doren, and engaged in the publication department of the New York World, left his residence to go duck shooting on Long Island. Previous to leaving he wrote a letter to his wife and children, who at the time were on a visit to his father-in-law, Sheriff Applegate, of Manhattan, N. J. In that letter he stated his intention to go on a sporting expedition on the following day, and concluded by promising to go to Manhattan on the following Saturday. At the same time he wrote another letter to his father, the Rev. H. H. Van Doren, of Boonton, N. J., in which he said he was going on a hunting excursion, and that on his return he would stop at Massport, L. I., and pay taxes on property which the father owned at that place.

On the morning of the 6th of December he left the house alone, and with his gun over his shoulder started for Great Neck, L. I., leaving word with a friend as he passed out of the door that he would return in the evening. Three days passed, and not having returned, word was sent to his wife, and afterwards to his father, who, with Sheriff Applegate, immediately started for Brooklyn. It was found that Van Doren's papers, money, jewelry and best clothes were in the house, and, in addition, a bundle of books, magazines, and some fruit was neatly tied up, which he intended carrying to his wife.

As the relatives were unable to find a clue to the missing man after a diligent search, Chief of Police Campbell, of Brooklyn, was conferred with, who immediately set two detectives to work to scour the island. Photographs of Van Doren were printed, together with descriptive circulars, offering a reward, and for three weeks every portion of Long Island was thoroughly scoured. Inquiries concerning the man's habits were made by the Chief of Police, but nothing was ascertained which could remove the impression that Doren had been foully dealt with.

After a fruitless search Van Doren was given up for lost. For seven months the father, who was deeply attached to his son, and who had always regarded him incompetent to play any serious joke on his friends, still believed that he was living, and during the entire time scanned daily the newspapers from all parts of the country which came under his notice. A few days since the following letter was received by the father at Boonton, N. J.:

"ROTTERDAM, Holland, May 21, 1873. My Dear Father: This, the first opportunity since leaving home, I take to write to you to explain my absence, and to let you know my whereabouts. On the day that I last wrote to you I started on a ducking expedition on the bay, near Fire Island. Sculling in a boat belonging to a schooner lying near, and in company with one of her crew, we were captured, and with great difficulty I managed to clamber on the upturned boat, my companion being left, he not being able to swim. Unable to right the boat I was compelled to cling to the bottom, and was drifted with wind and tide out to sea, being nearly out of sight of land by daylight the next morning, and nearly dead from cold, wet, hunger and fatigue. Some time after noon I was seen by the crew of a Swedish bark, bound to Buenos Ayres, South America, and by them rescued and carried on board in a state of insensibility, having become unconscious just as they reached me. An attack of brain fever kept me insensible for five days, and when I was again conscious we were far away at sea. I could do nothing towards my return until after being fifty-four days out. During a calm we boarded an English bark bound from the Pacific to Rotterdam, and knowing that I could find here chances to get home, and being on a vessel where no one but the captain could speak my language, I was glad to exchange ships, which I was enabled to do through the kindness of the English captain. A very long and tedious voyage to this port followed, we arriving only yesterday. I have already arranged to go to Philadelphia in a ship expecting to sail to-morrow in place of one of the crew. I could go home hence by steamer had I money to pay my passage, but the want of it compels my return in a sailing vessel. I hope to get home in about 45 days, and will see you very soon on my return. I need scarcely speak of the anxiety that consumes me, and unfits my mind for a sketch like this. Words are inadequate to express my feelings, and I live in the hopes of a speedy return to my loved ones. I will give a fuller description of my involuntary voyage on my return. Please give my love to mother and any friends with whom you may communicate. I send this, with other letters, enclosed to my brother-in-law, Dr. Applegate, which will explain the postmark. I would like you to write to me about June 20th, and address the letter to me at the American Hotel, Chestnut street, Philadelphia, and mark on the left hand corner: 'Hotel, please retain till called for.' I used to board there, and I will call for it on my arrival. Hoping this may reach you in about fifteen days and allay your anxiety to some extent on my behalf, and that soon I may see you again in health, I remain your affectionate son, 'J. E. VAN DOREN.' In addition to this letter a very affectionate one was written to his wife.
