The rain on Sunday interfered with the attendance at the churches. Cool air and moonshine brought out the healthy inhabitants on Saturday evening.

A severe storm of wind and rain swept over the town on Sunday about 11 o'clock A. M. Jacob S. Thomas is at work putting up a building to be used for merchandising on the lot opposite the Post Office.

A valuable colt belonging to Col. Bell died of lock jaw, last Saturday. By some means a nail had worked into the side of the pastern just above the hoof, but its presence there was not known until after the colt was dead. The Republican State Convention meets at Harrisburg on next Wednesday, the 13th inst. Dr. J. W. Dinwiddie, of Huntingdon county, was yesterday elected to represent this Senatorial District in said convention.

The Lutheran S. S. Celebration last Thursday passed off very pleasantly. The attendance was large, and the weather being delightful, all present doubtless enjoyed the shady grove. A heavy shower of rain came up about half past five o'clock in the evening, but fortunately, nearly all had reached their homes before the rain began.
