LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

It is lawful how to shoot deer. Since court the town seems dull. The oyster season has commenced. Northumberland is building a new furnace. A circus wagon killed a boy in Bellefonte week before last.

Reported by Wm. M. Allison. Court Proceedings.—The following is the balance of the Court Proceedings, of last week: QUARTER SESSIONS. Commonwealth vs. Cassius M. Dean. Indictment—Aggravated Assault and Battery. The prosecutor in this case, Henry W. Knisely, is a shoemaker, carrying on business in Patterson. The defendant is also of like trade, and works with his father, James W. Dean, in the same town. As usual in such cases, however reprehensible such conduct is, mutual jealousy existed between the rival sons of "St. Crispin," bosses as well as hands. It seems that the prosecutor, Knisely, in the course of events, coaxed away one of Mr. Dean's journeymen and helped him surreptitiously to remove his "kit" after night, while said jour was in debt to Mr. D. This fanned the smouldering fire into a bright and lambent flame, and, of course, mutual recriminations were the order of the day. The defendant and prosecutor happening to meet on the street, ris a ris, angry words were indulged in, accompanied, doubtless, with threats of personal chastisement on both sides. Cassius, unlike his immortal prototype, was not invoked to save his antagonist from sinking, but on the contrary became so thoroughly provoked, as to feel like sinking him, then and there, out of sight, which he proceeded to do by the rapid exercise of his dexter and sinister muscles, in other words, he "elouted" him. Defendant pled guilty to simple assault and battery. Plea was accepted, and he was sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 and costs.

Commonwealth vs. John Campbell, Sr. Indictment—Assault with intent to commit a rape. The prosecutrix, Nancy Shneloff, failed to make out a case against old "Jacker" Campbell. The details were too filthy for comment. The jury found the defendant guilty of the assault but not of the attempt, &c. The defendant left town without receiving his sentence. Fall forfeited. Com. vs. John Shneloff. Indictment—Perjury on oath of "Jacker" Campbell. True bill. Continued. Several other cases in Quarter Sessions in which true bills were found were continued till next term. COMMON PLEAS. C. W. Fleming for use of John McManigal vs. Jacob Beidler. Assumpsit on a promissory note. Defendant gave Fleming a non-negotiable note, who traded it to McManigal on a board bill. Defendant alleged that Fleming had been paid all or a large part of the note and claimed that as an offset against the note. The note called for \$100 with interest for some two years. Verdict for plaintiff for \$50.34, some charges on the defendants books being for money, which, of course could not be entered, money being no subject of book charge. J. L. Barner vs. Amos Miller. Assumpsit. Plaintiff and defendant were endorsers for H. Litter & Co. Notes went to protest, and hence they were jointly liable. Plaintiff, in addition, was bail for said firm individually on another note. Litter assigned some judgments to plaintiff to secure him, but they didn't quite reach, while defendant admitted his share of indebtedness had been provided for. Verdict by consent for \$18.50. Wm. M. Allison vs. Absalom Barner, Adm'r. of Nicholas Brocius, dec'd. After qualifying the jury and opening the case, plaintiff took a non suit. C. H. Smiley of New Bloomfield and F. E. Beltzhoover, of Carlisle, were admitted to practice in the several courts of Juniata. The Grand Jury reported in favor of an entire new Court House, which now enables the Commissioners to go on with the contract, and raise the necessary funds for the erection of the same. It will not be commenced, however, until after next February Court. The list for trial was an exceedingly long one, but it soon got grunted down by cases being ruled out, settled and continued, so that Court was enabled to rise on Friday afternoon at 3 P. M. An Argument Court will be held on the 8th of October next. There was quite a large crowd in attendance at Court up until Thursday evening, the Court House, at times, especially in the evening, being crowded. Better order inside and out of the Court House was manifest among those in attendance than formerly. Some few behaved as usual, but as no liquor is sold now, the local option law being strictly observed, they must have eaten something that disagreed with their stomachs, or perhaps made a mistake and drank too much river water.
