"The steamer Boston takes some \$200,000 specie, and the Sarah Sands, to go, hence on Friday, will take nearly as much. Specie is, however, coming in so first, that it accumulates in the banks, notwith standing the large exportation. The exchanges remain in favor of New York at all points. The unfortunate transfer of two millions to New Orleans in gold, a year ago, has disordered the exchanges on that point ever since. There are now eight millions of specie at New Orleans, with exchange one and a balf per cent in favor of New York. If the Sub-treasury had not removed the coin by force, New Orleans would have been saved this heavy loss in exchange, or at least a good portion of it.

n exchange, or at least a good portion of it "The exchanges remain in favor of New York, at all points, " says the Journal; and yet, " if subtreasury had not removed the coin by force, " this editor concludes that the exchanges would have been more nearly equal. We are really unable to see how the removal of the two millions of government money to New Orleans, where it was needed, from New York, where it was not needed, can have made the rest of the country indebted to New York -thereby offecting the exchanges.
