Johnson, (who had the floor,) had concluded, he was followed by Mr. Allen, who made a speech on the constitutional points involved in the resolution. The subject was then laid aside informally, and the Senate spent the remainder of the day in executive session.

House.—The bill relating to the compensation of Postmasters, was called up and passed, and sent to the Senate for concurrence.

Upon motion, the House went into Committee of the Whole, and considered several private bills.

Adjourned.
