An adjourned meeting of the Board of Trade was held, on Thursday the 21st inst., to receive a report from a committee of the Board, appointed to ake into consideration a memorial presented by a delegation of gentlemen from Steubenville, Ohio, on the subject of a Rull Road communication with The Memorial was read by Dr. John Andrews, TO THE PITTSBURGH BOARD OF TRADE At a late meeting of the Citizens of the town of Steubenville, the undersigned were appointed a committee to call the attention of your body to the Stepenville, the uncereasing the subject of a rail road connection between Pittsburgh and Steubenville, and thence westward by the Steubenville and Indiana Rail road, by way of Newark, or Mount Vernon with Columbus, Cincinnat, and St. Louis.

A Special Act was passed by the Legislature of Ohio, at its last Session, authorizing the formation of a company under a general law of the State, to construct a rail roadfrom Steubenville to the Indiana State line. This act confers upon the company that may be organized under its provisions, equal, and as great privileges as are enjoyed by any other rail road company in the State. The corporations named therein, aided by the citizens of Steubenville, and those residing along the route, have lind a survey and estimate made of so much of said John Harper, Sec'y. had a survey and estimate made of so much of said road as extends 35 miles from Steubenville to Urichsville by a competent engineer, and reconsol-sance thence to Mount Vernon by the same engineer, clearly establishing its practicability by east-er grades than have been ascertained upon any other route extending from the Obio river to the elevated platform of central Obio. This has also en ascertained to be the most direct and short est route by which Pittslungh can be connected with Cincinnati, the distance being but little, i any thing, over three hundred miles, one half o hich, extending from Cincinnati to Newark. already either completed or provided for; pursuing as it does a nearly straight line from Southwest to heast near the centre of the State, and midway between the great chain of Lakes on the orth, and the Ohio river on the South, it may with strict propriety be regarded as the only Con-tral rail road traversing the State of Ohio in the direction af resaid.
It is also worthy of remark, that whilst it traverses the central wheat growing region States, it also passes through the best coal formations of the State; and also one of the richest deposits of iron ore known in the country, containing, the advantages which, in regard to the travel from Cincinnati eastward; in regard also, to the agricultural and mineral products of the country it passes through; and also in reference to its practicability and shortness, no other road from Pittsburgh west-ward to Cincinnati can claim to possess. It clearly commends itself to the best interests and most se commends itself to the best interests and most se-rious consideration of the citizens of Pitteburgh.

The only part of this route unexplored, or, about which there is any uncertainty, is the connection between Pittsburgh and Steubenville. It is sup-posed that the valleys of Chartier's Creek, Robin-son's run, and Harmon's creek, present all the ad-vantages that can be desired for this purpose.— This, however, remains to be demonstrated by ac-tual exploration and careful survey. tual exploration and careful survey.

That this is an object worthy the aftention of those who may be so greatly benefited by the whole project as the citizens of Pittsburgh, cannot well be doubted. wen or doubled.

The Committee to whom was referred the appli-The Committee to whom was referred the application of the delegation from Steuberville, in relation to the examination of a rout of a rail road from the mouth of Chartier's Creek to the mouth of Harmon's Creek, have devoted as, much attention to that subject as their limited time and other engagement would permit. Without intending any disparagement to the general route now under examination by the way of Benver to Wooster and Mansfield, the committee have concluded to express their opinion, that such an examination is, on various accounts, highly desirable. The country along Chartier's Creek is well known to be richly and abfindantly supplied with coal of the BRAN. Worth 10c. in store-no change. Iry along Chartier's Creek is well known to be richly and abundantly supplied with coal of the very best quality, and it can scarcely be necessary to dilate upon the importance of that fact to this city. We have, it is true, an almost inexhaustible deposit of coal up the Monongabela and Youghingae, by rivers, and by means of our slack water improvements, we have strong assurance of an abundant and cheep supply at all times, unless some unforeseen occurrence or casualty should destroy abreseen occurrence or casualty should destroy lose improvements or render them unavailable— November, 1790, our rivers were closed with in November, 1730, our rivers were closed with ice, and continued so closed until the end of Feb-ruary or beginning of March following, being more than three months. Now, only suppose the same, thing to occur the ensuing winter, what would be the condition of our inhabitants, or of those manufactories which are dependent on the river for their supply of coal. The example of Cincinnati, a few years ago, would afford but a feeble illustration of the injury and suffering which would be endured

here. Our sterner climate and our more exclusive dependance upon coal as a fuel, would render us much more fatally vulnerable by such a deprivation.

But our slack water improvements are liable to interruption not by severe frosts alone, but are sub-ject to the hazards of floods, and it is impossible to foresee the effects which such a flood as that of to foresee the effects which such a flood as that of 1832 may have upon our locks and dams.
Should such a flood occur again—and surely we may expect it—and sweep away Dam No. 1, what then would be the situation of our city and the manufactories which depend upon the river for their supply of fuel? There is nothing pleasant in the anticipation of any such calamity to a great and prosperous city like Pittsburgh, so entirely dependent upon coal for health, comfort, and prosperity, but prudent foresight requires that we should think of it, and, if possible, provide against it. If any such provision or precaution against a great any such provision or precaution against a great calamity were contemplated, certainly no better one could be thought of than a rail road to Charier's creek, which could be intersected by branch es extending up all the tributaries to that creciall pouring into the main road their supplies of Years bygone a charter was obtained for a Railroat from Washington by the valley of this fine-stream to this city; nothing, however, was done under it, but the proposed survey for part of the distance would be up this same valley, and a rail road towards Steubenville would compose a por-tion of a road from this city to Washington, as well as to Wheeling. as to Wheeling.

No well informed citizen can doubtthat the coal No well informed citizen can doubt that the coal trade of Western Pennsylvania is destined at no very distant a day to approach, if not equal, in extent, that of the eastern portion of this, Commonwealth, and certainly there is no tributary of the Ohio which presents a richer or more accessible deposit of that valuable mineral, than Chartier's creek and its valuable branches. From each of these benefits a descentific grade can no doubt these branches a descending grade can no doubt be had to the Ohio, and at that point, Pittsburgh would at all times find a valuable resource in the of any fadure of supply from the Monongahele. neia.
Seubenville lies very nearly due West from this city and a rail road to that place would cut off a large bend of the Ohio, and avoid many of the most serious obstructions in its course.
