Arrest of a Clergyman.

A respectable Clergyman was arrested on Tues day, on a Capias ad satisfaciendum issued on a judgment obtained against him in the District Court, in an action to recover the penalty of fifty pounds, Pennsylvania currency, given by act of assembly for marrying a minor.

On Wednesday, however, the case was brought before Judge Hepburn, on a rule to show cause why the judgment should not be set aside. It appeared, from the Records of the Court, that the ntry of the judgment was entirely unwarrented. It was not entered with the knowledge of the Court, but privately in the Prothonotary's office, on the affidavit of the Plaintiffs attorney that he had served a rule to enter a plea, in ten days or judgment, on the 31st of January.
