The author was called the Great Unknown. The world was as much astonished and delighted with the wonderful novels, as curiosity was baffled in discovering their authorship.

Scott did not confine himself to poetry and romances: he became, also, a successful biographer and critic. -From 1796 to 1826 his life was busy and happy, and seemingly prosperous. His manly and sensible character commanded respect : his bonhomme and talent for increasing the hilarity of the social hour, conciliated the love of all who knew him. He purchased and built Abbotsford, and endeavored to revive old times in his noble mansion on the Tweed. The last few years of his prosperity were spent in a gorgeous dream.
