LIVERPOOL MARKET.

Cotton, for two days after the opening of the season, was in great demand for trade and export. Since the receipt of the Cambria's news, stocks have begun to accumulate, and the market is now somewhat quiet.

With fresh imports, which are offered freely, and, if anything, are depressed. The week's transaction ending yesterday, was 40,200, of which speculators took 4,470, exporters 50,000. The market is quiet.
