The campaign was opened on the part of the Whigs by Gov. Johnston parading Gen. Taylor through Pennsylvania, in August, with a set speech put in his mouth, that he was the special friend of American manufactures and particularly the friend of the iron interest. He was in favor of specific duties, and was even willing to violate his pledge of not interfering with the action of Congress, by recommending a change in the Tariff. Then came forward HENRY M. FULLER Pittsburgh, and from the Maryland to the N. He was a Native, an Irishman, the friend of the German farmers, and a Free Soiler, to suit circumstances. The Governor, too, tried his hand at bargaining with the Natives in Philadelphia, and the Free Soilers in the North;but the violated pledges of the late campaign stood out in bold relief in the memory of the people of Pennsylvania, and they were determined to rebuke both the National and State administrations. d The verdict pronounced on this occasion is clearly a verdict of the people against the upscrupulous men who thought they could practice de-


