It seems to be a disputed point still in England hether the recent attempts of Claussen and Done. an to prepare flar so that it could be spun by mach ar to that used in the manufacture of co have been entirely successful. The exper ments made at Manchester, and reported in the Mor ing Chronicle, were said to have been highly satis factory, but we have since seen paragraphs in the English papers which would go to show that these experiments were not at all decisive. What the Chronicle stated, our readers may remember was, that Mr. Claussen had devised a mod

of preparing the crude flax by which it was immediately adapted to the spinning machine, and as the main cost of flax was known to lie, not in its cultivation, but in the preparation of the fibre, by the process of rotting, breaking and cleaning, an expensive, tedious and laborious process, this discovery 28 per head, per year. These have reference to the was hailed as a most important one.

On the old method of preparing flax, the core must be first separated from the fibre, and then steel ed in water for five or six weeks, after which it spread upon the ground for a week or more, to be rolted by the dew. By these means the core ferments, and is afterwards easily disengaged by breaking and swinging. It may be rolted entirely
