Providential Escape: & One of the most miraculous escapes from an awit death that can possibly be conceived of occurred in Bedford on last Tuesday forencon. As Mr. Henry Miller, a citizen of the Borough, was driving two horses attached to a plough through the main street they became frightoned and ran off at desperate speed Mr. Simon Beard, a young man from Morrison's Core, was on the road, on horse-back, at the time Seeing the runaways coming, he tried to get out of the way, but his horse becoming unmanageable, he jumped from his saddle, when he was caught up on the plough-share and carried about three hundred yards, without receiving any injury other than a few cuts and braises, not considered dangerous! A sudden turnof the plough released him from his horrible situation. The horses continued to dash through the reet, sometimes on the pavement, until they reach ed the west end of the town, where one of them fell on a stone, which checked their career. They became detactied from the plough in the square. They were considerably cut, and trembled as if in much pain. Fortunately, the street was clear of children at the time.—Bedford Gazette.

RAILBOAD ACCIDENTS IN 1850 .- The annual re ports of the Eastern Railroad Corporations for 1850, show that forty-three persons were killed and thirtyfour severely wounded during 1850, on the railroads of Massachusetts, extending to Maine, Vermont, Connecticut, &c. Of the killed, two were engineers, (one by the explosion of a boiler) two merchandize conductors, one road agent, eleven brakemen, (mostly by striking bridges,) and two baggage masters; eleven were killed while on or crossing the track; five in consequence of being intoxicated; two passengers vere killed by accidentally falling from the platform of the cars. Only three passengers were killed while actually occupying their proper places in the cars, and this was in consequence of the breaking of an axle of a car on the western road, at Hinsdale.
