That whenever the clitzens of any Ward or Wards of the City shall subscribe the amount necessary for rebuilding any of the present Market Houses, or shall procure a site or sites for additional Market Houses, and the means for the erection of the same, they shall submit to Councils for their approval or amendment, the plan or plans on which they propose to creet the same, and when the said plan or plans have been so approved of by Councils, the same shall appoint a committee to not in conjunction with a committee of the same number, to be appointed by the subscribers to any of the said Market, who shall constitute a building committee, and whose special duty it shall be to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance, and to see that the said Market or Markets are creeted in conformity with the plans approved of by Councils.

Secroto 2. Be it ordained, &c., &c., That the City Treasurer and the Clerk of Clerks of said Markets, shall receive and collect the rents and revenue arising therefrom, and after first deducting the cost of repairs and other necessary expenses, the Treasurer shall pay over the proceeds of the said Markets annually, in the month of December, to the respectives subscribers to said Markets, in proportion to their respectives subscriptions, until they shall be fally reimbursed the principal and interest of the amounts respectively subscribed and paid by them: Provided, That before a dividend is declared in favor of the subscribers to the Market House or Market Houses in the Diamond, the Treasurer, shall retain for the use of the City, from the Proceeds of said Diamond Markets, the sum of \$4,500, annually.

SECTION 4. Be to ordained; &c., &c., That whenever the provisions of the hird section of this Ordinance shall have been fully compiled with the said Marketon Market Houses, with the grounds attached to the same, shall become the property of the City, together with the revenue and emolutuants arising therefrom.
