For the Erection of Market Houses.

WHEREAS, It is desirable that the present Market Houses be recenstracted, as well as other additional Market Houses be erected for the greater convenience and accommodation of the citizens; therefore, Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the citizens of Pittsourgh, in Select and Common Ununcils assembled. That whenever, the citizens of any Ward or Wards of the City shall subscribe the amount necessary for rebuilding any of the present Market Houses, or shall procure a site or sites for additional Market, Houses, and the means for the erection of the same, they shall submit to Councils for their approval or amendment, the plan or plans on which they propose to erect the same; and when the said plan or plans have been so approved of by Councils, the same shall appoint a committee to act in conjunction with a committee of the same number, to be appointed by the subscribers to any of the suid Markets, who shall constitute a building committee, and whose special duty it shall be to carry out the provisions of this Ordinance, and to see that the said Market or Markets are receited in conformity with the plans approved of by Councils.

Section 3. Be it ordained, &c., &c., That when any Market or Market Houses shall have been erected in conformity with the foregoing section, it shall be the duty of Councils, by ordinance, to chack such roles and regulations for the government of the same, and to appoint such officers as may be necessary for said Markets. point such officers as may be necessary for said Markets.

SECTION 3. Be it ordained, &c., &c., That the City Treasurer and the Cierk or Cierks of said Markets, shall receive and collect the ronts and revenue arising thereform, and after first deducting the cost of repairs and other necessary expenses, the Treasurer shall pay over the proceeds of the said Markets annually, in the month of Decembet, to the respective subscribers to said Markets, in proportion to their respective subscribers is until they shall be fully reimbursed the principal and laterest of the amounts respectively subscribed and paid by them: Provided, That before a dividend is declared in favor of the subscribers to the Market Houses of Market Houses in the Diamond, the Treasurer shall retain for the use of the City, from the proceeds of said Diamond Markets, the sum of \$4,500, annually.

SECTION 4. Bet is ordained, &c., &c., That whenever the provisions of the third section of this Ordinance shall have been fully complied with, the said Market or Market. Houses, with the grounds sinched to the same, shall become the property of the City, together with the revenue and emoluments arising therefrom.
