The rule is, that whom a party is brought, by a violation of his rights, within the reach of process, that process will not be allowed to be executed, until he is first placed substantially in status quo ante. He is not discharged on the ground of the stratagem or violence used in the arrest, but simply because his rights were first violated, in order to effect his arrest.

This prisoner stands charged by indictment with forgery, and had fled from justice. No right of his was violated by his arrest, for the pendency of the indictment is a good cause for his arrest, and in a

indictment is a good cause for his arrest, and in a civil action, could be pleaded in bar as a justifica-tion, by a private person acting without warrant. The difference between arrests with and without warrant, in such cases, operates rather on the evidence of justification, than upon the rights of the prisoner. With warrant, the party carries the justification in his hands; without warrant, he must prove guilt or a probable cause of suspicion.

The fact that the prisoner was arrested in another State, does not change the conclusion. He was subject to arrest there, and to trial here. His rights are not stated when the result is attained.
