Seduction Case at Springfield, Mass. EXCITEMENT AGAINST THE PRIEST-HIS STATE MENT.-The Catholic priest, Rev. J. J. Doherty, officiated in his pulpit, at Springfield, Mass., on Sunday. He made a speech to the audience, upon the prosecution against him, referred to accusations that he had paid \$1600 and other sums for a settlement, and read a paper drawn up by the counsel on both sides. The purport of it was that "for divers reasons, and especial-ly for the sum of one dellar received to his full tisfaction. Edward Monaghan agreed to with draw the prosecution pending against J. J. Do-herty for the seduction of his daughter, Mary Monaghan." He said that he settled for the sake of peace and because he could not expect an impartial trial. It was not true that he had ever, in any manner or form, made a confession of guilt. God knows his innocence he said im-

VIRGINIA CONVENTION .- The Virginia State Reform Convention has determined that the juisdiction of the county courts shall be regulated by law.
