It is here worthy of remark, that a hitherto unknown seam of very pure hematite iron ore, has been found near the surface, on the so called "Preston" or "Pomper Smash" tract of land, belonging to the Aster and Washington Coal Companies. It varies in thickness from two feet six inches to three feet. About a thousand tons mined on an adjoining lot, the mineral right of which is owned by Messrs. Ford, Armstrong & Pearcy, readily commands two dollars and fifty cents per ton, delivered on the spot. The cost of mining is not over fifty cents per ton. The remarkable uniformity and fidelity of the stratification of this region, induce the belief that similar deposits of lead, plumbago and iron, exist in all the coal lands of the basin. Truly the mineral wealth of the Cumberland coal field is as yet but imperfectly known.—Cumberland (Md.) Civilian, June 20.

GOLD COINAGE. - Much complaint continues to be made against the coinage of gold coins of a heavy denomination. An able writer in the Car-"The first move on the political chess board was to create a demand for silver coin, to send abroad—to remove the silver out of the way of the dollar note and shinplaster. When this was successfully going on, doubtlessly, from the same influence, the 'United States Mint' hit upon the lan of coining but little else than double eagles— \$20 gold pieces. Hence, the silver coin, gold dollars, quarter and half eagles, then in circuation, with the few peices of the small denomiations still coining, could soon be gathered up by their agents and kept from circulating among the people. Thus have they romoved from cir-sulation among the farmers mechanics and laboring men, the gold and silver coins, so that their

small notes and shinplasters might pay them for their wheat and labor. This is the whig cry of 1840 now verified by themselves—'gold for the office holders and rags for the people!'"
