Allegany Bridge Case. Court of Common Pleas, before the Hon. Judge Nichols. Sixth Day, Monday, August 16. At the call of the roll, the case of the jurors, who live at a considerable distance, was found to be absent. After waiting about an hour, arrived, at the Court proceeded to business. John Harper, plaintiff, was offered in witness, besides the business testimony of the company's treasurer, a statement of the defendant's files and documents. The number of shares (1400) subscribed. The drawback to be allowed in any case, unless the Collector receive the evidence most satisfactory to himself, that the cost of transportation does not exceed the sum of 10 cents per 100 pounds. This resolution to take effect from Monday next, the 11th of August, and to remain in force for one year from this date.
