Pursuant to a call in the several newspaper of the City, and by handbills widely distributed, a large concourse of citizens assembled at Wilkins Hall last evening, to consider on the present state of affairs in Cuba, and to express their sentiments in relation to the late acts of the Spanish Cuban authorities. On motion, W. W. IRWIN, Esq. was chose President of the meeting, John P. Glass, Thos. Scott, James Watson, W. W. Dallas, Wm. Moor head, Vice Presidens, and Lynde Eliot, John Mellon, and Joseph Snowden, Secretaries. On motion, a committee of five, consisting of Messrs. James Dunlop, O. H. Rippy, W. J. Rose. F. Egan, and James Pettigrew, was appointed to draft resolutions expressive of the views of the meeting. The Committee having retired, the presiden made some very appropriate and eloquent remarks in relation to the objects that claimed the attention of the meeting. After which, owing to loud and repeated calls from the multitude Col. Samuel W. Black came forward and ad dressed the meeting in a truly happy and eloquent manner for about half an hour. The speech of Col. Black we shall give hereafter, if Upon the conclusion of Col. Black's speech the Committee appointed for that purpose re ported the following resolutions: Whereas, We recognize the principle as true and holy, that a free people should sympa-thize with down-trodden nations who strive, by just and legitimate means, to render themselv free. And whereas, in all cases we likewise recognize the principle that "resistance to ty-And whereas, They have openly and boldly, before the whole world, raised aloft the banner of independence throughout the Island, proclaiming the reasons of their revolt and their despite of the utmost exertions to re-vanquish the Governor, succeeded in maintaining a heroic and often victorious conflict, thus proving them-selves capable, sincere and brave—worthy the confidence and admiration of mankind; therefore,

Resolved, That they have our warmest sympathies in this, their hour of greatest need, and our most heartfelt prayers for their speedy, complete and glorious triumph.

Resolved. That while the despots of Europe, in defiance of every law of justice, human and divine, claim and exercise the right of interferoverwhelming force, to suppress and trample out the sacred flame of liberty wherever it appears, and whenever it may suit their conveni ence. We, as citizenz of the great American Republic, do here assert that the time has come when the voice of this nation should be heard. and the rigor of her arm be felt, in favor of all who battle in the cause our sires died for, and who call on us for aid.

Resolved, That while totally disclaiming all desire or intention of exciting rebellion within the limits of any state with whom we are at peace, we do most positively declare, that since the people of Cuba have thus valiantly thrown off the yoke of servitude, it is our opinion that the re-establishment of Spanish tyrange at the re-establishment of Spanish tyranny, attended with every circumstance of redoubled cruelty to the inhibitants of Cuba, as well as come treaties, can enter into no engagements which violate the rights of one single freeman among the many millions who cover these independent States—can do nothing which jeopardizes our national security or stains our national honor—can make no concession derogato ry to our dignity and our rank as a great, a free and a powerful people.

Resolved. That we regard the atrocious and cowardly butchery of 50 Americans, captured on the 15th of August, either on the coast of on the 15th of August, either on the coast of Cuba or on the high seas, who were mercilessly shot on the morning of the 16th in or near the streets of Havana, beneath the gaze of a hooting and jeering mob,—an action whose ferocity and barbarity is a stain upon the name and nature of man, and degrading the proud flag of Spots. Washington to demand instant and thorough ex-planation for the slaughter of our lamented felnoble death.

Resolved, That in the opinion of this meeting the indiscriminate shooting of the fifty prisoners at Havana, on the 16th of August, was a coldblooded, inhuman and atrocious act of cruelty, disgraceful to a civilized community.

Resolved, That though those men may have been accord. been engaged in a lawless expedition, and un-protected by our national flag; still they were neither pirates nor robbers, but brave and honsoldiers, seeking the restoration to liber ty of the down-trodden—many of whom stood high in our estimation for their private charac-Spanish barbarity were captured beyond the maritime jurisdiction of Cuba, or put to death without trial, or if their remains were mutilated or insulted after death by the counivance of the ror to the bloody tyrants of Spanish myrmidon Mr. Dunlop moved that the resolutions be adopted as reported by the Committee. Mr. Ross moved to amend this motion by striking out the following resolution:-Resolved, That this meeting commend the conduct of the National Administration, in preserving their faith to the treaties with Spain, in their earnest efforts to intercept and suppress expeditions against the Government of Cuba, This motion gave rise to some discussion. and on the question being taken the resolution was declared to be stricken out. The question was then put on the adoption of all the other resolutions, and they were declared to be adopted by an almost unanimous vote. Calls were now made from every part of the Hall for P. C. Shannon, Esq. who came forward, and addressed the assembly in a strain of glowing eloquence for about half an hour.

At the conclusion of the speech of Mr. Shannon, Mr. John Farrell made some remarks. He was followed by Wm. J. Rose, Esq. who made a very eloquent


