New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, &c., are as entirely unrestricted as though they were all under one government. A letter mailed anywhere in the United States goes to any post office in Great Britain or the North American Colonies, vice versa, according to direction, without any conditions whatsoever. It may be prepaid or it may the rate of postage is the same, whether it is
