The first reference in the "Dispatch" was made to a report of the proceedings in Birmingham, on the occasion of the visit of Kossurn to that place. There was no necessity for any reference to the report in the "Post" by that sheet; and yet it was characterized as being very inaccurate-doing Kossuth great injustice, &c. As the Reporter did not pretend to give any thing more than an abstract of the speeches delivered on that occasion he does not now-nor did he then-claim for his report any other character than that of truth, so far as he pretended to give the sentiments of the great Hungarian leader; and he furthermore thinks that all the wisdom, backed by all the assurance, of the writer of the articles in the "Dispatch" could not concoct any thing that would be quite equal to any thing that might emanate from Kossuru. The writer of this thought, on the appearance of the first paragraph in the "Dispatch," that he might, possibly, have failed in correctly reporting some important idea of the distinguished orator; and he therefore, took no notice of the article. In that paper of yesterday morning, however, there is another paragraph, in which it is said that the translation of Kossuth's speech, published in its columns on Saturday, (for which it acknowledges its indebtedness to the German "Staat, Zeitung,") is "the only correct version." Now, as the writer of that article knows nothing of what he has written, it is fair to presume that he has gone to the same source for the latter paragraph upon which he drew for the former; and as there can be but one motive which has prompted him to indite both, that motive can only be esteemed as insignificant as the source from which it emanated. The Reporter for the "Morning Post," need only say, in conclusion, that several of the best German and English scholars in Pittsburgh, (one of whom was by his side during the delivery of Kossuth's speech to the Germans,) who were present on the occasion, say that it was a most excellent and accurate report.
