The Robbery of the Suffolk Bank, at It was stated, under our telegraph head, on Friday, that a defalcation had been discovered

in the Suffolk Bank, at Boston. The New York papers contain the following additional facts: Officers Bowyer and Wm. H. Stephens, of this city, on Wednesday Inst, while at the dock of the steamship Asia, at Jersey city, in search of an individual for whom they had a warrant, who was expected to sail in that vessel, observed two gentlemenly dressed young men go on board the vessel, and suspecting from their manner that all was not right, remarked to Sheriff Bliss, of Norwich, Conn., who was with them, that they look-ed like two rogues. The sheriff replied, "Oh no, I know them well: one of them is Charles Brewer, receiving clerk in the Suffolk Bank at Boston, and the other Albert T. Converse, of Norwich." This did not satisfy the officers, however, and they decided to arrost them on suspicion. With this view they proceeded to Brewer's state-room, and demanded, in an authoritative tone, "Where is that money? how much have you got?" and other similar questions. Brewer and the satisfactors and the same and the tions. Brewer was taken quite by surprise, and began to tremble and show evidences of guilt.

The officers then commenced searching his carpet-bag, in which they found \$6,000 in gold coin, and a check for \$982 on a banker in Wall street. Brewer made a partial confession, by admitting he had done wrong and saying he was
