XXXI CONGRESS—FIRST SESSION. WASHINGTON, June 10. SENATE—Various important petitions were presented.

Mr. Brooks offered a resolution calling for a report on the expediency of constructing a ship canal through the Isthmus of Florida.

Mr. Hoke proceeded to the consideration of a bill granting the right of way and land to Florida and Alabama in aid of the construction of certain railroads in those States.

On motion of Mr. Jones, of Texas, the bill was laid on the table.

After an ineffective attempt to take up the Pennsylvania election case the House went into Committee of the Whole on the State of the Union and took up the Indiana appropriation bill when Mr. Mechem made a speech in favor of the proposition of domestic manufactures.

Mr. Dattow, one of the exponents from the left caucus, justified his course.
