Board of Health, in view of the prevalence o hydrophobia among the dogs of that city, has published the following notice: 1. Every person bit by an animal who is mad or suspected of being mad, should immediately press the wound on all sides, to force out the

blood and the virus.

2. The wound should then be immediately washed with volatile alkali, with soap suds, with lime water, with salt water, or pure water, or if none of these are at hand, with urin 3. An iron, at white heat, should next be pressed deeply into the wound.

These directions, if rigidly followed, will be found sufficient to ensure against the possibility of the appearance of this frightful contagious
