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SUBVENER GENERAL'S REPORT

We are indebted to the Hon. J. Forster Bannett, Secretary General, for a copy of his Annual Report for the year ending November 30, 1881.

The work done in the office of the Surveyor General, from the 1st of November, 1881, to the 31st of November, 1881, inclusive, for which he has received, amount to \$390,100. A large number of copies have been made for the use of County Surveyors, for which no fees are received, and in many instances persons writing for copies to enable them to make correct maps.

The number of patents (81) issued during the year ending November 30, 1881, being (with the exception of the year 1851) larger in number than in any year for the last thirty years. The fees alone (excluding the purchase money and interest) paid into the State Treasury for patents and warrants, amount to the sum of \$11,691.00, being about \$4,000 more than all the expenses of the Land Department.
