To remedy this serious hinderance to elemen ation, the old alphabet has been revised and onlarged, so as to give to each sound a single letter : which letter, and never any other, always stands for the same sound; so that the art of reading consists simply in being able to speak in rapid succession, the sounds of the several letters in every word. Thus, when the pupil has equired the ability to read or to spell, a few words of the average number of syllables, he has the ability to spell and read any words in the

Scores of results similar to these might be referred to, but it is unnecessary at present ; it will be sufficient for us, to have called the attention of teachers and parents to the subject. Here is a field for experiment, that promises a rich hervest. Already, in many parts of the country, the new system is being adopted in the schools, especially in the cities of Boston, Cincinneti. St. Louis, &c. The subject is commonded to the consideration of all interested, and every individual in community, has some interest in a matter of this kind.
